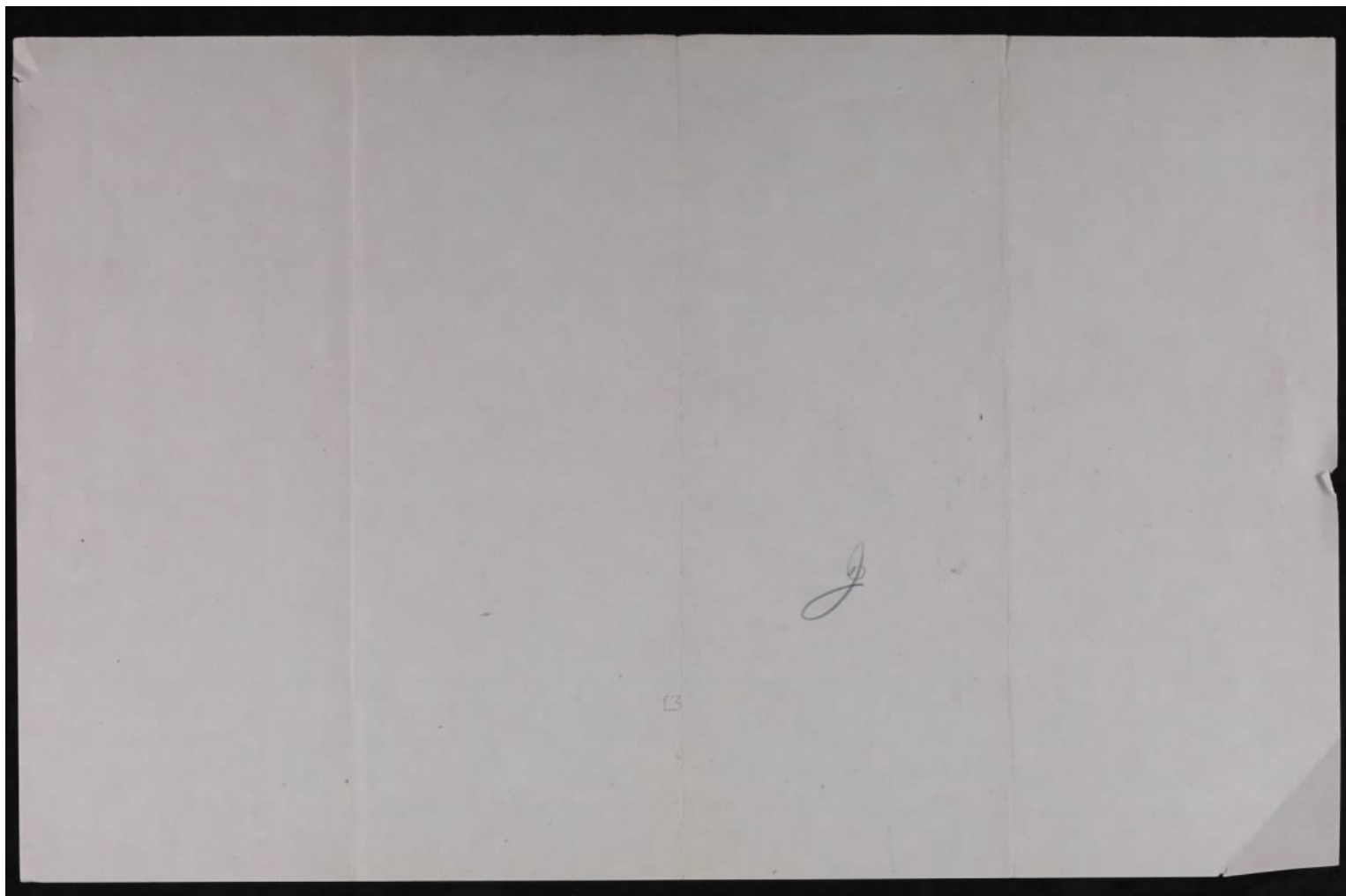

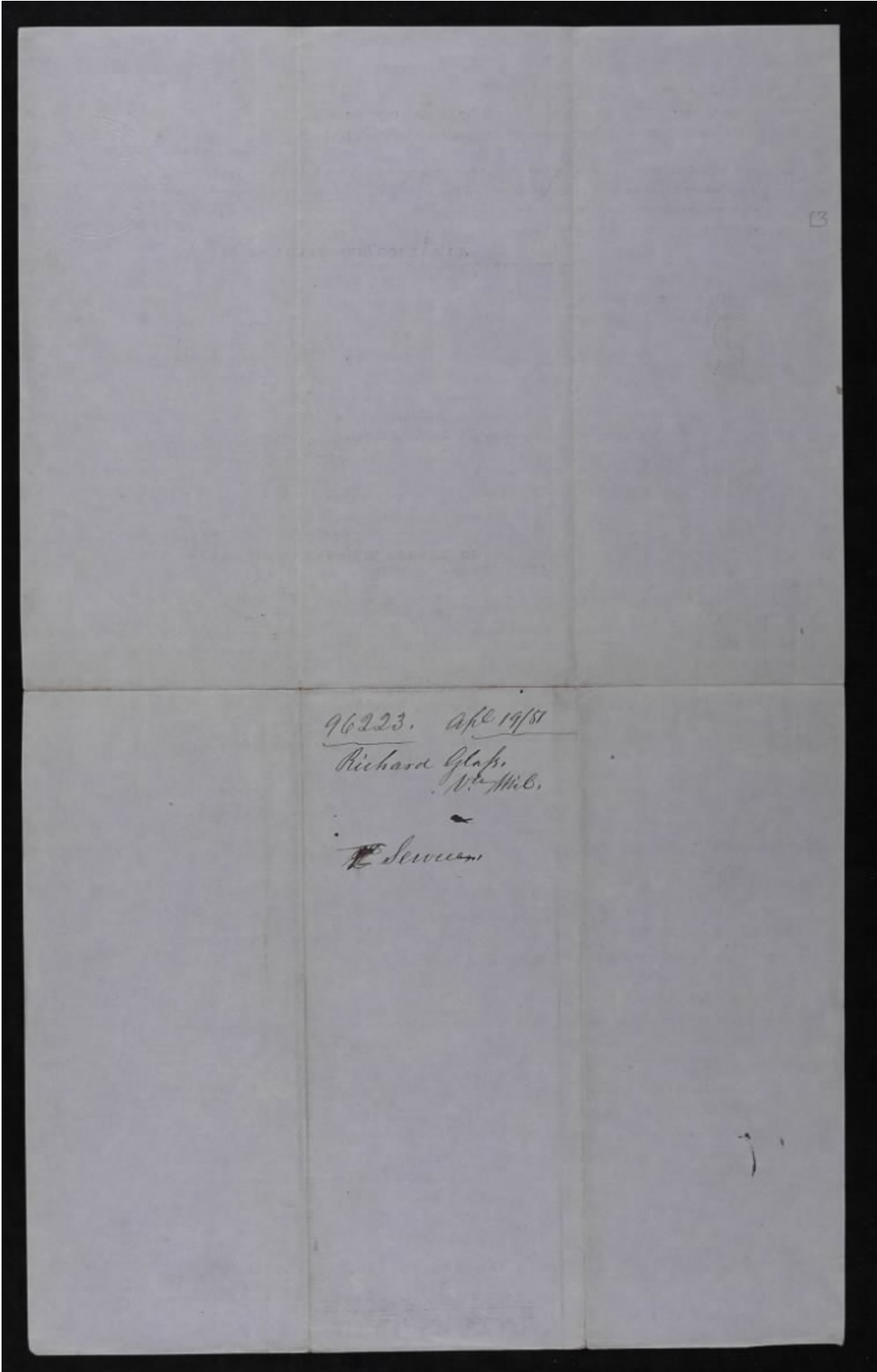

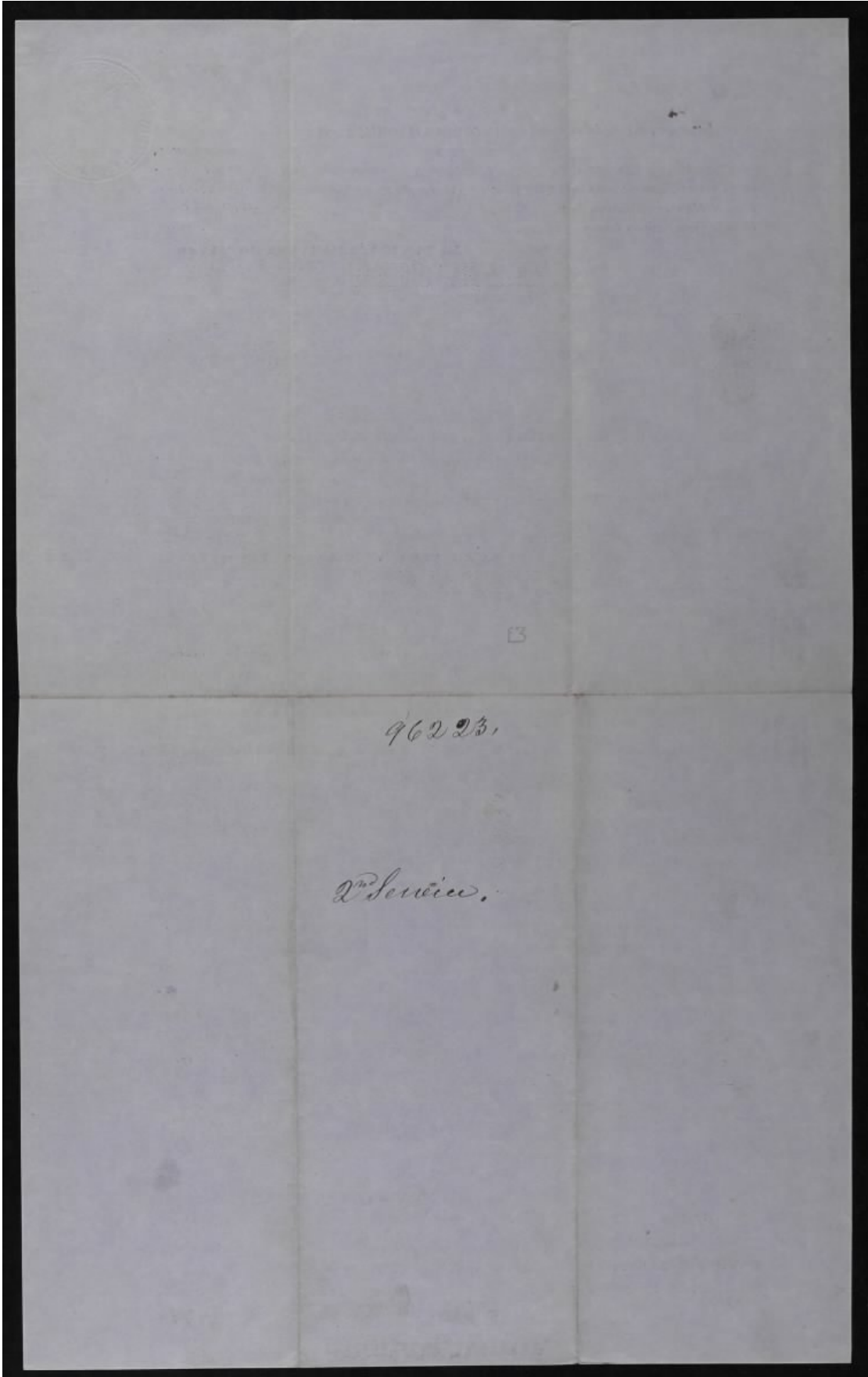

D. one thousand eight hundred and seventy one, personally appeared before me, David Tate, Judge of the Probate Court, a Court of Record within and for the county and State aforesaid, Richard Elph aged Seventy four years, a resident of Jackson County of Alabama, who, being duly sworn according to law, declares that he is not married; that his wife's name was Polina Campbell, to whom he was married at Rockbridge County, Virginia, on the 1816 day of 1816; that he served the full period of sixty days in the (1) military service of the United States in the war of 1812; that he is the identical Richard Elph who (2) was drafted in Captain John Dismas company, Boyd's regiment, Virginia brigade, Virginia division at Lexington, Rockbridge Co. Va., on the 1814 day of April, 1814, and was honorably discharged at Norfolk, in Virginia, on the July day of July, 1814; that (3) he was drafted and served as a private in said Company as above & that he afterwards joined the army and remained in the military service of his country until the close of the war with Great Britain - & that in 1850 while a citizen of Coffee County Tennessee he recd from the Government two military - not date forgotten & that his discharge is lost

that he, at no time during the late rebellion against the authority of the United States, adhered to the cause of the enemies of the Government, giving them aid or comfort, or exercised the functions of any office whatever under any authority, or pretended authority, in hostility to the United States; and that he will support the Constitution of the United States; that he is not in receipt of a pension under any previous act; that he makes this declaration for the purpose of being placed on the pension roll of the United States, under the provision of the act approved February 14, 1871, and he hereby constitutes and appoints, with full power of substitution and revocation,

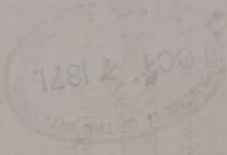
