Madam:

I advise you that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, W. 230, it appears that Samuel Jones, of Franklin County, North Carolina, a Lieutenant of the North Carolina Line, entered the service, October 4, 1777, was promoted to Captain, September 11, 1781, was in the battle of Eutaw Springs and others not named, and continued as Captain to the close of the Revolution.

He married in October, 1790 ( marriage bond dated September 27, 1790 ) in Granville County, North Carolina, Elizabeth Goodloe, daughter of Robert Goodloe. They were married at the residence of her father.

Soldier moved from Franklin County, North Carolina, to Davidson County, Tennessee, thence to Maury County, Tennessee, where he died in October 1831, day of month not stated and his age is not given.

His widow, Elizabeth, was allowed pension on her ap-

plication executed April 14, 1849, while residing near Tuscumbia in Franklin County, Alabama, with her nephew, Albert Gallatin Goodloe and another relative, J.C. Goodloe, relationship not stated. She was then aged seventy-six years. She died in 1854 in Madison County, Tennessee.

Soldier was survived by several children, all of whom were dead in 1857 except Robert Jones and Mrs. Polly Glass. The first child of said Samuel Jones and his wife, Elizabeth, was Sally Applewhite Jones, born November 7, 1791, no other names are given.

Soldier's daughter-in-law, Katharine A. Ews Jones, was living in Maury County, Tennessee, in 1849, aged forty-six years.

The following grandchildren of soldier were living in 1857: Samuel H. Jones, of Maury County, Tennessee; N. W. Jones; Julia A. Thompson; W.K. Jones; Henrietta S. McBride; A.M. Jones; Ann W. Leftwich; Mary F. Jones; Frank A. Jones; A. Clinton; Mary R. Stevens; W.G. Cockrill; Iredel Cockrill; Rufus Cockrill.

The widow, Elizabeth, had a brother, William Goodloe, born October 22, 1769, in Franklin County, North Carolina, and was living in Madison County, Kentucky, in 1849. There are no further data on file as to family.

law, by Joseph Turner an acting Justice

years on the 22<sup>nd</sup> day of October next, states  
that when about fourteen or fifteen years  
of age in Franklin County, North Carolina,  
near Lewisburgh, within about fifteen miles of  
where he was born, he became acquainted  
with Captain Samuel Jones, and I was very  
frequently in his company until late in Septe-  
mber or early in October 1790 he mar-  
ried my sister Elizabeth Goodloe. I was  
present and saw Capt. Samuel Jones and

When I first became acquainted with  
Captain Samuel Jones in 1783 or 1784  
he was called Captain Jones, and uncer-  
tainly said to have been a Captain in the  
Revolutionary War. I never heard it ei-  
ther doubted or contradicted but that  
Samuel Jones served in the Revolutionary  
War as Captain. I understood he entered  
the army as Lieutenant of the North  
Carolina Continental Line, and was  
afterwards promoted to Captain and  
continued to serve as Captain till the

close of the war. I was present and witnessed a meeting between Capt. Samuel Jones and Col. Sall Lewis in <sup>Spencer</sup> ~~Madison~~ <sup>Spencer</sup> County Tennessee. The meeting was very cordial and they recognized each other as Revolutionary Officers and Soldiers, and talked a good deal about the incidents or circumstances of the war, and their services, but I cannot now recollect them with sufficient accuracy to detail them. Lewis called Jones Captain.

In response to your letter dated the fourth instant, and received the sixth, I have the honor to advise you that from the papers in the claim (Wid. File No. 230) of Elizabeth, widow of Samuel Jones, it appears that Samuel Jones, (the date of whose birth was not stated) a Lieutenant of the North Carolina Line on the Continental Establishment entered the service on October 4, 1777, was promoted to Captain on September 11, 1781 and continued as such to the close of the war. He was in the battle of Eutaw Springs and various others, names of which are not given.

He married in Granville Co., N. C. in October, 1790, Elizabeth, daughter of Robert Goodloe, their marriage license was dated September 27, 1790; and he died in Maury Co., Tenn. in Oct. 1831. She was allowed pension on an application executed April 14, 1849 while a resident of Franklin Co., Ala., aged 76 years, and she died in 1854 in Madison Co., Tenn.

Their oldest child, Sally Applewhite, was born Nov. 7, 1791. In 1807 their only surviving children were Robert

I advise you from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim W. 230, it appears that Samuel Jones of Franklin County, North CAROLINA, a lieutenant of the North Carolina Line, entered the service October 4, 1777, was promoted to captain September 11, 1781, was in the battle of Eutaw Springs and others not named, and continued as captain to the close of the Revolution.

He married in October 1790 (marriage bond dated September 27, 1790) in Granville County, North Carolina, Elizabeth Goodloe, daughter of Robert Goodloe. They were married at the residence of her father.

Soldier moved from Franklin County, North Carolina, to Davidson County, Tennessee, thence to Maury County, Tennessee, where he died in October 1831, day of month not stated and his age is not given.

His widow, Elizabeth, was allowed pension on her application executed April 14, 1849, while residing near Tuscumba in Franklin County, Alabama, with her nephew, Albert Gallatin Goodloe and another relative, J.C. Goodloe, relationship not stated. She was then aged seventy-six years. She died in 1854 in Madison County, Tennessee.

Soldier was survived by several children, all of whom were dead in 1857 except Robert Jones and Mrs. Polly Glass. The first child of said Samuel Jones and his wife Elizabeth, was Sally Applewhite Jones, born November 7, 1791, no other names are given.

Soldier's daughter-in-law, Katharine A. E. Jones, was living in Maury County, Tennessee in 1849, aged forty-six years.

The following grandchildren of soldier were living in 1857: Samuel H. Jones, of Maury County, Tennessee; N. W. Jones; Julia A. Thompson; W. K. Jones; Henrietta S. McBride; A. H. Jones; Ann W. Leftwich; Mary P. Jones; Frank A. Jones; A. Clinton; Mary R. Stevens; W. G. Cockrill; Iredel Cockrill; Rufus Cockrill.

The widow, Elizabeth, had a brother, William Goodloe, born October 22, 1769, in Franklin County, North Carolina, and was living in Madison County, Kentucky in 1849.

There are no further data on file as to family.
